On Saturday June 11th, join us for a 1.2 mile out-and-back trail and tour of the Pinnacle Knob 1937 Fire Tower!

- Come see the beauty of Kentucky like you've never seen before, while learning the detailed history of the tower and how it was utilized. The Pinnacle Knob Fire Tower, USFS R-8 model 14'x14' live-in cab on a 40' steel tower, is the last of its kind in Kentucky. Built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1937 on the Cumberland Falls State Park, it overlooks a part of the Daniel Boone National Forest. It was abandoned in the 1960s but was restored and reopened for tours in 2008 as a state park historic site.
